Deanna is Vice President for Healthy & Resilient Communities at Conservation Law Foundation (CLF), a regional environmental advocacy organization in New England. In her role at CLF, Deanna oversees four teams working on community resilience, research & partnerships, impact investing, and farm & food. The Healthy & Resilience Communities program works in partnership with communities, civic leaders, universities, and impact investors on a portfolio that includes the largest participatory action research study in the country focused on health and place; three impact investment funds for healthy neighborhoods totaling \$85 million that have produced more than 500 units of workforce housing; a Legal Food Hub that has connected 800 New England farmers and food entrepreneurs with pro bono legal support; and advocacy for more equitable, inclusive, and climate-resilient development. Deanna previously served as Director of Environmental Planning at CLF where she managed climate resilience advocacy.

Prior to joining CLF, Deanna worked for a community development financial institution (CFDI) in New Jersey where she assisted local governments and other stakeholders in devising and implementing neighborhood revitalization strategies including the reclamation of vacant and abandoned properties. She has consulted on a number of planning and policy-based projects for organizations including the Southern Coalition for Social Justice and the New Jersey Climate Adaptation Alliance. Deanna is active in a number of professional organizations including the American Planning Association, American Institute of Certified Planners, and the American Society of Adaptation Professionals.

Joan Fitzgerald is a Professor of Urban and Public Policy. She focuses on urban climate action and strategies for linking it to equity, economic development, and innovation. In her fourth book, Greenovation: Urban Leadership on Climate Change (Oxford Univ. Press, 2020), she argues that the climate strategies of most cities represent random acts of greenness rather than integrated and aggressive action. She points to leading cities in North America and Europe and offers strategies for cities to accelerate their action. She is leading a team at the Dukakis Center that is conducting an assessment for the Boston Foundation's Boston Climate Progress Report. The report will assess Boston's progress on its climate action and resiliency plans with particular focus on equity. She is co-authoring a new book, Cities and the Struggle for Climate Justice. Fitzgerald blogs on urban climate action on Planetizen. She teaches The 21st Century City, Cities, Sustainability & Climate Change, and Intro Environmental Science & Policy.

First elected in 2018 to represent Annapolis and southern Anne Arundel County, Senator Sarah Elfreth is the youngest woman ever elected to the Maryland Senate. She is passionately committed to serving her constituents

both in the State House and in the community. Sarah worked with colleagues across the aisle and around the State to pass 84 bills - all with bipartisan votes - she sponsored in her first five years in office. These new laws range from implementing the largest investment in Maryland's State Parks, creating Maryland's first Office of Statewide Broadband, providing treatment to veterans living with PTSD, expanding critical prenatal care for healthy Maryland mothers, and protecting forests, oysters, and clean water.

Sarah serves on the Budget & Taxation Committee where she Chairs the Subcommittee on Public Safety, Transportation, and Environment Subcommittee and is responsible for balancing and overseeing the budgets of over 20 departments and agencies. As one of two senators representing Maryland on the multi-state Chesapeake Bay Commission, Sarah works with colleagues in Pennsylvania and Virginia to build regional consensus and implement policy solutions to protect and restore the Bay. She also serves as the Senate Chair of the Joint Committee on Program Open Space & Agricultural Land Preservation and the Joint Committee on the Chesapeake & Atlantic Coastal Bays Critical Area.

As a member of the Budget committee, Sarah fights to secure tens of millions in funding every year to support local projects and nonprofit organizations serving District 30. These include investments in the Thomas Point Lighthouse, the historic Stanton Center, Wellness House, the Woodland Beach Fire Department, the Brewer Hill Cemetery, Arundel Lodge, Annapolis Maritime Museum, both the Annapolis and Mayo American Legions, and the YWCA.

Sarah graduated, magna cum laude, from Towson University and holds a master's degree in Public Policy from The Johns Hopkins University. Prior to her time in the Senate, Sarah served as the Director of Government Affairs for the National Aquarium and as Director of University Projects for Margrave Strategies where she focused on economic development in university towns.

Outside of the Senate, Sarah teaches public policy at Towson University's Honors College and works as a senior advisor on conservation and fisheries management campaigns. Despite receiving the "Baby Senator" trophy in 2019 for joining the chamber as its youngest member, Sarah's success in passing legislation has earned her numerous "Legislator of the Year" awards from community and statewide groups, including: the Maryland Military Coalition, the Park Rangers, the Maryland Affordable Housing Coalition, Preservation Maryland, the Maryland Library Association, among others. She lives in downtown Annapolis.
